I pray that your heart will be enlighten and you will be encouraged to pray more earnestly for the different peoples of Central Asia.

I am preparing a sermon on the Holy Spirit which is proving to be difficult. Why? Because I taught an



Institute Class on the subject which was four 90 minute class sessions. Reducing the teaching to a 35 minute sermon is like taking the mattress that Pastor Steve referred to in his sermon and squeezing it back into the box. But I do have a verse of all verses that says so much about the Holy Spirit: "But you will receive power when the Holy Spirit comes on you; and you will be my witnesses in Jerusalem, and in all Judea and Samaria, and to the ends of the earth." (Acts 1:8)

The success of God's global mission lands squarely on the wide shoulders of the Holy Spirit. How has he done? Marvelously, with over 2 billion professing Christians in the world right now. Just think, he began with 120 in the upper room of Acts 1 and here we are today. However, my question to us is, do you think the Holy Spirit is satisfied? When the athlete hands in his/her uniform they are calling it quits. But the Holy Spirit is still empowering genuine believers to tell the story as witnesses for Christ.

We often think of the Spirit inspiring us, transforming us, and producing fruit in us. But that means nothing unless the Holy Spirit is using us to be the hands and feet of Jesus. ...jobless young men. Economic prospects have improved recently, as both tourism and employment opportunities for women have improved.

Most Christians come from minority groups, and large numbers have returned to their ancestral homelands since independence. Evangelical Christianity, especially Pentecostals/ charismatics, grows among those who remain. Russians and Koreans have some freedom to evangelize their own people, but the government punishes any who attempt to reach Uzbeks or other Muslim peoples. Tashkent is the Islamic capital of Central Asia, in numbers and influence.

Turkmenistan

Present-day Turkmenistan covers territory that has been at the crossroads of civilizations for centuries. The area was ruled in antiquity by various Persian empires, and was conquered by Alexander the Great, Muslim armies, the Mongols, Turkic warriors, and eventually by the Russian Empire.

Turkmenistan is one of the most difficult countries for evangelical churches, and the government maintains tight control over religious groups. Hostility against almost any foreign Christian activity or even presence has persisted for over 20 years. Almost every foreign Christian has been expelled. Several national pastors have been exiled, beaten, heavily fined or imprisoned. The twenty or so registered congregations continue to be intimidated and forbidden to meet.

Pray...

...for a softening of the attitude of the authorities, for courage for Christians in Turkmenistan to stand firm and for Christians outside of the country to pray and speak upagainst these hostile actions.

- Pray for the Muslim peoples of Uzbekistan to hear - in a way they can understand and respond to - the good news of Jesus.
- Pray for those persecuted and in prison, that God may give them strength and boldness.
